Purpose

Mission

Siskiyou **A**fterschool **F**or **E**veryone (SAFE) programs offer academic support; quality expanded learning opportunities and fitness promotion to Siskiyou County students in a positive and safe environment.

Vision

Our goal is to facilitate a mindset to thrive by fostering an enthusiastic, creative community of learners and by positively impacting the lives of Siskiyou County youth.

Operating Principles

SAFE programs will strive to implement high quality SAFE programs by fostering the below Operating Principles to guide the quality of their site.

- Employ and train high-quality staff.
- Host SAFE services at a high-quality facility.
- Implement high-quality afterschool programming.
- Connect with and collaborate with high-quality partnerships in the community.
- Foster high-quality engagement for student attendees.

Universal Program Requirements

SAFE programs are to follow the mandated program requirements listed in the table in order to receive funding to run an ASES program; all twenty (20) SAFE sites follow the program and receive funding. To ensure all Universal Program Requirements are being met, the Director of Expanded Learning works with school administrators while the Area Liaisons of Expanded Learning visit SAFE sites at a minimum of one time per month and work with SAFE site coordinators. Area liaisons assist with providing program support; observe programs in action; and provide technical assistance, resources, and professional development training when appropriate. Area liaisons are not evaluators but provide needed support to make sure all SAFE site staff are equipped to meet the Universal and LEA program requirements. Each area liaison visit to a site is documented on the Site Observation Visit form. The area liaison will document on the form that the program requirements are being met.

Physical Activity	Provide opportunities for planned and organized physical activity for students weekly.

Program Administration

As the Local Education Agency (LEA) of SAFE programs, SCOE – Expanded Learning Program currently oversees twenty (20) individual afterschool programs located throughout Siskiyou County. The current SAFE set-up is unique because although the funding to operate this program is administered by SCOE, each site is allowed flexibility to operate its own program, provided SCOE – Expanded Learning Program and California Education Code guidelines are followed.

Each SAFE site is administered by its own superintendent and/or principal. SCOE – Expanded Learning Program works collaboratively with each site administrator during site visits and monthly SCOE-sponsored administrator's meetings. A monthly newsletter, Expanded Learning Update, is published and handed out at each administrator's meeting as well as sent to administrators and site coordinators via email.

SCOE is the grantee and fiscal agent of SAFE programs, which are funded entirely with ASES dollars. As the fiscal agent, SCOE is responsible for all financial aspects of the grant and ensuring compliance with the grant requirements, guaranteeing no less than 85% of the grant award is expended on direct services to students.

All students in kindergarten through eighth grade are eligible and welcome to participate in SAFE programs, as the LEA, in collaboration with each school district, can determine the grades to be served at each SAFE site, including Transitional Kindergarten students, based on the local needs of the community. (EC Section 8482.3(a)). Transitional Kindergarten students are not funded by the ASES Grant unless they meet the set qualifications of turning 5 years of age by December 2nd of the current school year or until they turn 5 years of age when their birthday falls after December 2nd.

Target Population Recruitment

SCOE – Expanded Learning Program staff work collaboratively with all twenty (20) SAFE sites to recruit and retain students to achieve and maintain attendance requirements of the afterschool programs.

Recruiting Plan to increase enrollment in SAFE programs

1. Each site will offer registration for SAFE programs as follows:
 - a. Back-to-School Night offered by each site in the beginning of the school year will provide information packets for their SAFE program and include registration information.
 - b. Allow for open registration for new student enrollment throughout the year.
 - c. Encourage pre-registration in the spring for the following school year.

2. SCOE – Expanded Learning Program and SAFE sites will collaboratively advertise programs using:
 - a. Monthly School Newsletter – outlining what is taking place in individual SAFE sites.
 - b. SCOE Newsletter and Administration Meetings
 - c. Websites
 - d. Brochures
 - e. Attendance at Community Events
 - f. Positive Word of Mouth

On average, many of the school SAFE sites serve more than their funded amount. With waiting lists at some sites, annual recruitment is not an issue. It will be the focus to have continual recruitment activities throughout the year to communicate the positive impact SAFE programs have on the students and families in Siskiyou County.

3. The site coordinators will collaborate with their SAFE site administration and teaching staff to identify students with low academic performance to determine their need for homework assistance in afterschool programs as a recruitment option. Each site will determine a student's need for homework assistance per the district benchmarks.

4. Additional Recruitment to Consider
 - a. Student Safety – no one home, transportation, etc.
 - b. Waitlist – Every student attending a school operating a SAFE site is eligible to participate in the program subject to program capacity. If a waiting list is established, students are enrolled according to the date their enrollment application was received.
 - c. Recruitment efforts will focus on homeless and foster youth students. As indicated in the above list of students served, many fall in this category. Site coordinators will work with SCOE – Expanded Learning Area Liaisons and the Foster and Homeless Youth Director to identify and invite students.
 - d. Attendance and enrollment are tracked through the Universal Cityspan electronic attendance system. This is monitored monthly to evaluate a site's need for additional recruiting efforts throughout the year.

1 -Safe and Supportive Environment

All twenty (20) of the afterschool programs throughout Siskiyou County are located on their designated school campuses. In order to provide a safe physical and emotional environment during SAFE, each program must intentionally involve students, families, school staff, and community members as stakeholders. Based on information from annual surveys, the data collected will be used to inform implementation of best practices and establish systems that evidence shows will enhance the quality of the learning environment in afterschool.

Staff Level:

In doing so, SAFE staff will learn about student likes and dislikes, know triggers, and address each student by their preferred name. ● Implementing positive behavior management systems that focus on prevention versus punishment.

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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Aligning and following regular school day behavioral management systems. ● Enrichment activities that promote students learning to listen, communicate, empathize, accept, and support others. ● Team building or collaborative enrichment opportunities where students learn how to work as a group. These activities will support a welcoming environment for all. ● SAFE staff communicating with each other to strategize best practices to help students who show signs of trauma related behaviors and implement trauma informed practices. ● SAFE staff utilizing resources from community partners such as SCOE – School Based Mental Health and Wellness, First 5 Siskiyou, Local Resource Centers, Karuk Tribe, or other local partners with resources that promote the social emotional wellbeing of students and families.
Physical	<p>Physical needs of students will consist of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● SAFE staff who offer physical activities daily to students in the form of outside recess, planned physical enrichment, community programs, sport participation through SAFE, or physical fitness clubs. ● SAFE staff who plan ahead on the activity calendar, at a minimum one time per week, a physical fitness enrichment. Student participation will be highly encouraged. ● SPARK curriculum and a sports cart with additional physical fitness materials to help in planning engaging enrichment activities. ● Nutritious snacks and/or meals provided to every student each day in attendance. 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2—Active and Engaged Learning

Having active and engaged students during SAFE is the ultimate goal of the program. Experiential student-centered learning in afterschool includes “doing” activities that allow them to be physically active, stimulate their innate curiosity, value their topics of interest, and allow them to be hands-on. SAFE site staff will engage in a project-based learning approach where they facilitate student activities for active learning as opposed to adult-focused instruction.

All levels will continually use research and evidence-based practices to guide and plan their educational literacy and enrichment activities, streamline daily schedules, and develop trainings and meetings to support the learning focus of SAFE students.

Programmatic Level:

School District Superintendent and/or Principal	<p>It is the expectation that each school district will develop its own procedures that establish protocols regarding how students will be provided an environment that promotes opportunities for culturally relevant and high-interest activities.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Each District will use its designated research and evidence-based best practices, district benchmarks, and data-driven feedback to guide the planning of educational literacy and educational enrichment activities that will align with the regular school day to enhance positive youth development. ● Support SAFE site coordinators to develop active and engaged learning enrichments for all students which can include providing needed supplies, inviting community guests to do activities, or planning field trips. ● SAFE programmatic level staff will participate in disbursing student, parent, and staff surveys on an annual basis in the spring.

In addition, offer students a time to engage in local service projects that build positive youth development. ● Plan community events that invite SAFE site families to come take part in the afterschool program and see what the program has to offer. Some events sites have planned are Back-to-School Night presentations, Lights on Afterschool, carnivals, inviting parents to be activity presenters, or Siskiyou County Fair project displays.

3—Skill Building

Active learning opportunities that develop new skills or create mastery of skills are a focus of SAFE programs. All SAFE participants will ensure hands-on, project-based activities focus on skill-building through 21st Century Skills: creativity, collaboration, communication, information literacy, media literacy, technology literacy, critical thinking, and flexibility.

Programmatic Level:

<p>SCOE – Expanded Learning Program</p>	<p>It is the expectation that SCOE – Expanded Learning Program will provide guidance to each SAFE site on best practices for students being provided developmentally appropriate skill building for academic and social-emotional success in afterschool. Suggestions will be documented on the SAFE Site Visit form each month to support districts to implement systems that exhibit exemplary skill-building practices.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Collaborate with Ninja Coalition and Valor Talent agency to bring high-quality and interactive experiences to Siskiyou County that will foster enhancement of student 21st Century Skills. ● Partner with Write Brain to offer project based learning to enhance skills in social-emotional learning and English language: writing, reading, speaking, and listening. ● Sponsored activities or contests will be offered throughout the year covering topics that will build skills in community impact, computer science, writing, and science. ● Each year all SAFE sites will be encouraged to complete a project to present at the Siskiyou County Golden Fair. The CEO of Siskiyou Golden Fair will communicate what the fair topic/theme will be so that programs can align their projects. The completed SAFE fair projects will culminate in a final presentation where all Siskiyou County community members can view them.
<p>School District Superintendent and/or Principal</p>	<p>It is the expectation that each individual school district will develop its own procedures that establish protocols regarding how students will be provided opportunities to develop and demonstrate 21st century skills.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Locate and offer tutoring support for students to achieve academic success. ● Provide guidance to site coordinators on homework assistance and reading support. Decide appropriate time length to ensure students are getting the help needed to align with regular day academics. When regular day and afterschool are aligned and both are aware of the learning taking place during the school day, it will ensure consistency in building skills over time. ● Support SAFE site coordinators to offer clubs related to student interests which can include providing needed supplies, finding a space to host the club, or collaborating with people and agencies that are specialized in the club theme. ● No-cut policies for all to play sports are in place for schools utilizing sports through the SAFE program. Team sports are an excellent avenue for skill building.

4—Youth Voice and Leadership

SAFE programs will provide and support intentional opportunities for students to play a meaningful role in program design and implementation and provide ongoing access to authentic leadership roles. Students will be encouraged to take on leadership roles and responsibilities during the course of SAFE.

Programmatic Level:

SCOE – Expanded Learning Program	<p>It is the expectation that SCOE – Expanded Learning Program will provide guidance to each SAFE site on best practices for students to have opportunities for youth voice and leadership in afterschool. Suggestions will be documented on the SAFE Site Visit form each month to support districts to implement systems that exhibit exemplary youth voice and leadership practices.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">● Each spring an evaluation designed by SCOE – Expanded Learning Program will be provided to obtain feedback on student experiences in afterschool.● Student surveys will be intentionally designed to give students a more meaningful role in program design and implementation at all SAFE sites. Student survey questions will include more open-ended questions used to elicit meaningful answers.● Offer professional development throughout the year to all SAFE site staff in addition to site specific training based on community need to facilitate youth voice and leadership.
School District Superintendent and/or Principal	<p>It is the expectation that each school district will develop its own procedures that establish protocols regarding how students will be provided opportunities to develop youth voice and leadership.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">● Provide spaces for programs to permit students to share their viewpoints, concerns, or interests in order to impact program practices by participating in program surveys, leadership programs, or student-lead group discussion.● Encourage programs to identify a need in their community where student voice and leadership can develop a solution.● Through student feedback, the needs and interests will be implemented and adjustments to homework and enrichments will be made.

Show action speaks louder than words by using quality leadership skills. This has a positive impact on students. ● Service learning projects are offered to students to allow older students to actively exercise their leadership skills by addressing community and real world problems. 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5—Healthy Choices and Behaviors

SAFE programs will promote student well-being through opportunities to learn about and practice balanced nutrition, physical activity, and other healthy choices in an environment that supports a healthy lifestyle.

Programmatic Level:

Suggestions will be documented on the SAFE Site Visit form each month to support districts to implement systems that exhibit exemplary healthy choices and behaviors.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Partner with First 5 Siskiyou, CalFresh, and Public Health to provide training annually on healthy choices and behaviors ● Contract with SCOE Nurses to provide SAFE sites with training as needed to meet student nutritional and educational needs ● Provide professional development opportunities to explore the connections between health and academic performance and positive social emotional interactions. ● Provide healthy food options at training throughout the year, modeling nutritious choices to implement in programming.

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6—Diversity, Access, and Equity

SAFE programs will create an environment in which students embrace diversity and equity regardless of race, color, religion, sex, age, income level, national origin, physical ability, sexual orientation, and/or gender identity and expression. High quality SAFE programming will play a key role in offering a safe place for students to be their authentic selves in a space of acceptance to and from others.

Programmatic Level:

<p>SCOE – Expanded Learning Program</p>	<p>It is the expectation that SCOE – Expanded Learning Program will provide guidance to each SAFE site on best practices to ensure SAFE programs are offering an environment that welcomes all students to be their authentic selves. Suggestions will be documented on the SAFE Site Visit form each month to support districts to implement systems that promote positive atmospheres that honor diversity, access, and equity.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Utilize SCOE resources to ensure any students who have barriers are able to participate in SAFE with appropriate accommodations if needed. ● Ensure communications provided to SAFE programs are offered in multiple languages per Siskiyou County populations in the varying districts. ● Provide professional development opportunities to increase SAFE staff knowledge and program development that focus on implementation of diversity, access, and equity for all participants. ● Share information to support all SAFE program needs including, but not limited to: assistance with seeking food and housing, medical assistance, community service programs, and strategies to provide equality through equity to promote understanding, compassion, and tolerance.
<p>School District Superintendent and/or Principal</p>	<p>It is the expectation that each school district will develop its own procedures to establish protocols regarding how students will be provided services to enhance understanding and engagement with diversity, access, and equity for all.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Hire staff that are reflective of the student population. ● Reach out to students and families who have potential barriers to participate in the program. Connect with the Foster and Homeless Youth department, nurses, Special Education, English Language Learning support, or LGBTQ staff. ● Design the program to accommodate the needs of the students attending. ● Each district has a different demographic; SAFE staff are provided information to better understand their learning community. ● All students are eligible to join SAFE programs.

**RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF SEEKING DEFERMENT OF LAPSATION
FROM THE SISKIYOU COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION**

WHEREAS, the Klamath River Union Elementary School District is a K-8 school district in Siskiyou County that has had average daily attendance greater than six pupils for many consecutive school years; and

WHEREAS, the District has an average daily attendance a fewer than six pupils during the 2021-22 school year for the first time and fewer than 6 pupils during the 2022-23 school year for the second time.

WHEREAS, the District's Board of Trustees has considered Education Code section 35780 and related statutes, which require lapsation of a school district with fewer than six pupils in grades kindergarten through eighth grade, but allows the county board of education to defer lapsation up to three times for a one-year period; and

WHEREAS, the District's Board of Trustees determines that it is in the best interests of its pupils and the community to remain a separate school district for the 2023-24 school year, in light of the past history of average daily attendance numbers and the likelihood of additional pupil enrollments in the future, as well as the benefit to the community of having a locally organized school district; and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the District's Board of Trustees, pursuant to Education Code section 35780, hereby acts to defer lapsation for the 2023-24 school year and seeks concurrence from the Siskiyou County Superintendent of Schools and subsequent approval by the Siskiyou County Board of Education; and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee is directed to take all actions necessary to carry out this resolution and related procedures.
