

## Hooper School District

The exact location of the school house is not certain. In 1920 the district "...was lapsed and territory annexed to district from which it was formerly taken"! (Lincoln District)

The Hooper School was located at the gold mining settlement of Hooperville, located four and half miles up Indian Creek (Scott Valley) from the junction of the Scott River and Indian Creek Roads. No remains of the school may be found, but the remains of many old buildings are still there.

The gold mining town of Hooperville was named after Frank Hooper. It now has a population of two. In its day, (1854) it had a population of between four and five thousand.

Miss Jennie Falkenstein was the teacher in 1899. There were 15 pupils in attendance. The last teacher was Kate Bailey (1918-1919).
